Mentors and Mentees can collaborate on grant proposals or publications because they discover that they have mutual interests and similar goals. As always, the goal of our **monthly e-newsletters** are to provide information on resources, upcoming events, mentoring tips and other items of interest designed to help you be more effective.

*Take time-out for Lunch with your Mentor. Did you know that we reserve the small dining room at the Ropp Center on campus twice a month to provide you and your Mentor a place to meet? Take advantage of this resource to meet your Mentor for lunch and let them know how things are going in your world. If you are in another college, you will be going through your own annual evaluation process. Talk with your Mentor about your major accomplishments in each of teaching, research, service this year. Discuss how best to highlight these accomplishments. Also discuss how to address any potential issues with teaching evaluations, grant proposal production and/or success rate, publications, progress of graduate students, etc. If your haven't been submitting a Self-Evaluation, ask your Director if it is okay to do so. Ask your Mentor to review it and provide some constructive feedback. In 10 years as a Director, I always found a well-written, honest self-evaluation to be of benefit. Also include goals in teaching, research and service for next year as part of your Self-Evaluation. These can be great motivators and guides for next year!
