- * Email your Mentor and set a lunch date today! Set a lunch date for sometime in the next few weeks (or later, if you and/or your Mentor are out of town) and review the attached Faculty Mentoring Needs Assessment to generate some topics to discuss with your Mentor over the next few months. Take the initiative and set up your next meeting!
- * Do some Summer Reading! Summer is the perfect time to get caught up on your reading. Select a book on a professional development topic that interests you leadership, networking, communication, emotional intelligence, social intelligence, negotiation, strategic planning, or topics such as stereotype threat, implicit bias and more. Talk to your Mentor about reading the book and discussing it with you this summer. It can be a great way to share some professional development and gain insight from your Mentor and their related experiences. My recommendations include Blink and Tipping Point by Malcolm Gladwell, Now, Discover Your Strengths by Tom Rath, Good to Great by Jim Collins, Emotional Intelligence and Social Intelligence by Daniel Goleman, Women Don't Ask by Linda Babcock and Sara Laschever, and Whistling Vivaldi by Claude Steele. The OWISE Library has a number of books that can be checked out for free (including the last two on my list) just see Ms. Shultz in the Dean's Office to check one out.
- *NSF's new Strategic Plan. I returned from a large NSF PI Meeting in Washington, DC, a week ago and learned that NSF's new strategic plan, "Empowering the Nation Through Discovery and Innovation, NSF Strategic Plan for 2011-2016," contains some valuable information. NSF is re-tooling under new Director Subra Suresh, including plans to combine programs, integrate funding for teaching and learning, as well as revised broader impacts criteria and broadening participation requirements throughout the Foundation. This article on "Practices of Successful (Group) Leaders" is from Stanford's Rick Reis' *Tomorrow's Professor* column (don't let the title fool you - Rick Reis' material is valuable for every professor, not just the professor of tomorrow). All of us lead, even new faculty, at some point - even if it's only in our labs or in the classroom. This article discusses how to stimulate and

challenge, activate focus and goal direction, support member involvement, determine group commitment to an idea, model effective behavior, as well as recognize and reward.
