*Come enjoy some Coffee and Treats while you meet with your Mentee. You have asked for a dedicated time to talk with your Mentee, so here it is! Our first Mentee-Mentor Coffee will be Tuesday, October 2 from 9 - 11 a.m. in Bogard Hall 301. It is come and go - email your Mentee right now, agree on a 30-minute window where the two of you can come over, enjoy coffee and cake, and talk about a couple of important issues!

*Do a spot check on classes. With a couple of weeks of the quarter under our belts, it is a good time to chat with your Mentee and see how classes are going this fall. Are they teaching a new class? Do they have an issue that has bugged them for a while that they'd like to resolve? Ask them their favorite thing about teaching, as well as what they would change if they could do one thing different. What would they say are their strengths? Things that they could improve? Help them think about student engagement, learning, motivation, etc.

*It's Board of Regents time. Fall quarter means Board of Regents Support Fund grant application time. Be sure to talk with your Mentee about applying for this great program. Enhancement,

Mentoring Tip for September:

Too often, teaching is a lot like a one-way street. As faculty, we find ourselves shoveling information at them as fast as we can (even faster on the quarter system!), trying to cram it all in before the next test, rarely having enough class time for information to flow back from them to us. There is a great tool, however, than can help you keep track of how things are going, what's confusing, whether or not they are swamped, and more. It is called a **Minute Paper**. It takes about a minute (hence the name) at the end of class and consists of just two questions: 1) State the most important/useful thing

that we discussed today (from your viewpoint)? and 2) State the question(s) that remain uppermost in your mind at the end of class about today's material. Students respond on a sheet of paper and turn in before they walk out the door. You can read over them, answer the questions, and use the information to do a quick review at the beginning of the next class. I have been doing these for at least a decade. It works no matter what class I am teaching and I can read 40 of these in 15 minutes or less. Students consistently tell me that the quick review at the beginning of class based on their Minute Papers is the most helpful thing we do all quarter. It lets you figure out that they are all lost on topic X before they all flunk the related question on the test. It also lets you clear it up the next class day, before their confusion gets compounded by the new material, which builds on what they don't understand. Check out the attachment for a copy of the questions, as well as some suggestions on how to implement it in a class. You can find even more great ideas in the classic book, Classroom Assessment Techniques by Thomas Angelo and Patricia Cross.
